

OLEAN PUBLIC LIBRARY 2021 Annual Report to the Community

Celebrating 150 years!



In 2021, the Olean Public Library turned 150! The first library in Olean opened its doors on August 15, 1871, in a spaced donated by John G. Pelton within his tailor shop on Union Street. At that time, the library charged annual dues to its members and was known as the Olean Library Association. Between 1871 and 1888, the library moved to several different temporary locations to house its growing collections, including the second floor of the Exchange Bank and the Olean Opera House.

By 1895, the library board began to consider how to become a free library and thereby access funding through the state of New York. On December 13, 1906, the institution was renamed the Olean Public Library and became free to all citizens of Olean, and in 1908 the board doanted the library property to Olean's Union Free School District, allowing the library to be supported through annual school tax funding.

Now that the library had become publicly owned and and free, Andrew Carnegie was willing to contribute \$40,000 to construct a new facility that would meet the needs of the rapidly growing Olean community. The cornerstone for the new building was laid on July 3, 1909.



By the mid-1960s, it became clear that the magnificent building was no longer a practical facility for library operations. After considering doubling the size of the Carnegie building, the board instead decided to renovate the former Loblaw's Supermarket into a new library that would easily be made handicapped-accessible. The library remains at this location to this day.



2021 Highlights

Approximately 500 patrons attended the Olean Public Library's 150th birthday party in August. The first 150 children received a free commemorative stuffed squirrel and were told that they must read to the squirrel daily to keep it happy! There were many activities including a prize wheel to win 150th promo items, face painting, birthday card making, balloon animals, and snacks.

The Library, in collaboration with the Race Unity Circle of Olean, was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the WNY Foundation to run educational programs to spark conversations around race.

OPL was also awarded an outreach mini-grant from the Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System (CCLS) to enhance our current partnership with CORE: The Learning Center, by advertising the opportunities that English as a Second Language learners now have in the library, and to buy learning materials.


The Children's Department was awarded two mini-grants from CCLS. One was used to provide items for the *Lobster Tales Cooking Club*, a program designed to boost literacy through cooking. The other was used to provide new yoga mats for the popular *Stories and Stretches* program, which helps give kids the tools they need to connect to creativity while acquiring listening and literacy skills, body awareness and character development.

A permanent endowment was established for the Library by former resident Kevin O'Connell and his wife Susan, in honor of Kevin's late mother, Frances Bean O'Connell, who was an artist and ardent library user. The program helps fund high-quality arts programs at the Library. The endowment was named the Frances Bean O'Connell Arts Program Fund and is overseen by the Erie Community Foundation in Erie, PA.

In 2019, the Library received NYS Public Library Construction Aid in the amount of \$186,500 to replace two of its 30-year-old rooftop HVAC units with new energy-efficient units. In 2021, we put in another application this year to replace the remaining two older units, and because the funds were awarded, the Library will begin replacement work in 2023.
