Bestselling Author and Olean native Susan Wiggs Slated to Speak at the historic Old Library Restaurant on April 9

Olean Public Library is pleased to present Olean native and bestselling author Susan Wiggs this **April 9, 2022 at 7 p.m.!** Tickets are now available either in person at the library by check or cash, or by card on www.eventbrite.com. Attendees can choose either a free ticket for Wiggs' talk, or a \$25 ticket to include the reception and delicious hors d'oeuvres prepared by the Old Library Restaurant.

We interviewed our library board president, former elementary teacher Lanna Waterman, about her interest in Wiggs' books.

OPL: When did you first discover Wiggs as an author?

LW: Several years ago in a stitching group a friend (who had similar tastes to mine) suggested *The Lakeshore Chronicles* as a series I might like. I really did enjoy that series, and went on and read several of her other standalone books.

OPL: What about her stories do you enjoy the most? Who do you think would enjoy her work?

LW: I like the way her books center around strong family ties and relationships...even when they are complicated. She deals with real situations and weaves them into an intriguing story. Women would enjoy her stories, as they are usually from a woman's perspective. Any reader who likes Robyn Carr or Sherryl Woods will likely enjoy her too. I think anyone from Olean would enjoy particularly *The Lakeshore Chronicles*, as that series is based in this area and has some local references. One place that she mentions several times is Palmquist Jewelers, a local family run jewelry store in the '60s and '70s.

OPL: What interesting facts should we know about Susan Wiggs?

LW: When I first started reading her books, I had no idea she was born in Olean...the same year I was! At one point I went to her website to check it out, and the page started with a picture of the children's room at the old Olean Public Library on South Union, the same children's room I frequented as a child! That, of course, piqued my curiosity. I found out that she would probably have gone to School 10 (Ivers J. Norton) as I went to School 5 (Boardmanville).

OPL: Which Wiggs books are your favorites?

LW: It's hard to pick a favorite because they are very different. I loved *The Lakeshore Chronicles* because there were 11 books, so you really got to know the characters and felt like you were part of the Avalon Community. I even met a woman once who had named her cat Daisy Bellamy after one of the characters! Another book I particularly enjoyed was *The Oysterville Sewing Circle*. It dealt with a much more serious topic of abuse and how it can be found in the most respectable of homes and important businesses. I also enjoyed the *Bella Vista Chronicles* as they talked about the Danish Resistance during WWII, which I didn't know much about. I often don't like when stories go back and forth in time, yet she made it very easy. I also liked *Family Tree*. It talked about how family recipes can tie the current generation to the past. I loved the connection.

OPL: Some of her books have recipes. Have you made one? LW: I did make the Polish Apple Strudel, and Happy Cake!

OPL: Which of her books would work well for book clubs?

LW: The Oysterville Sewing Circle would, as would The Beekeepers Ball, and one of her more recent ones, The Lost and Found Bookshop. That one deals with the question, "What would you do if you could relive your life?" And I loved the idea that "there is a book for everything." She has a new one coming out this summer too, called Sugar and Salt.

OPL: What are you looking forward to asking Susan about?

LW: I'm curious about her life in Olean, and how long she lived here. Did she attend summer camp like what she portrays in her stories? And maybe if her recipes are old family recipes or ones she just looked up for the novels? I'm also curious which of her books are her favorites. She's written so many ... I've still got several to go.

OPL: We're looking forward to this event, we'll see you there on April ninth!

LW: Yes! I also read somewhere that her book *The Apple Orchard* is being made into a movie, and *The Lakeshore Chronicles* might become a series, so we have that to look forward to. I can't wait!

Stories and Stretches: Thursdays at 11:00 am


Children **ages 2 to 5.** A fun movement-oriented program with stories, songs, stretches and moving!


Simply bring a device to be eligible to play. We always have lots of fun and snacks!

Join us for this showing of a cultural phenomenon starring Reese Witherspoon. We will definitely have popcorn, so stop in to hang out!






Rainbow Alliance | Thursday, March 24 | 6:00-7:30 pm in the Gallery





