






The Library will be closed Saturday March 30th for Easter.



Solar Eclipse Glasses available at the library beginning March 1st until supply runs out. 2 pair per person limit.



On April 8th, 2024 the Southern Tier will experience a total solar eclipse. In preparation for the event Star Library Network (Star Net), funded through the Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation, and the Space Science Institute is donating solar-viewing glasses to libraries across our region. The library's supply of glasses was also augmented by a donation of glasses from the Emergency Preparedness Division of the Cattaraugus County Health Department. A Total Solar Eclipse happens when the Moon passes between the Earth and the Sun. This causes the Moon to totally obscure the image of the sun for the viewer on Earth. Since the Moon blocks the Sun for a few minutes this will cause a period of darkness, which on average is up to 3 minutes. The Enchanted Mountains will be a part of the upcoming total solar eclipse on April 8th, 2024! Within the county, the time of the eclipse will range from 2:00pm - 4:45pm. Totality, on average, will begin at 3:18pm in the Enchanted Mountains.

Why is it a Big Deal? The last total solar eclipse to pass over New York State was on January 24,1925. There won't be another **total** eclipse over us locally until 2045. This is a once or twice in a lifetime opportunity!

Don't look directly at the sun without proper safety filters. When buying solar glasses or filters, make sure they meet the **ISO 12312-2**

requirements. To avoid PERMANENT DAMAGE TO THE EYES, you MUST wear Solar Eclipse Viewing Glasses to safely view the partial phases of the eclipse!






Investigation Stations | Tuesdays at 6:30 pm OR Wednesdays at 3:30 pm



Emily Edmunds, the new Sustainability Campaign Educator (also known as an energy advisor) for Cornell Cooperative Extension in Cattaraugus County as well as Allegany and Chautauqua county will be in-library to answer questions. She works with people to help them become more sustainable, reduce their energy costs, and improve their home to be more energy efficient which in turn improves their health, comfort, and safety. She works with contractors, PUSH green, and other partners to help residents find the right programs to help weatherize and insulate their homes, install different heating and cooling equipment, save on energy costs, or talk about rooftop and community solar. The program helps residents of low to moderate income, disadvantaged communities, and small minority and women owned

businesses find out information of the services offered and what finances can help improve their household. Information or assistance to free or reduced cost energy assessments, installation services, low-cost financing, and solar. Some programs are income eligibility based and work with people who are on SNAP, HEAP, or SSI. Come learn more about the programs and the financial incentives that are offered. Gallery Exhibit: March 2024 Butterfly Experience by John MacRoy



A sneak-preview of spring will be on display at the Olean Public Library during the month of March. Olean native John MacRoy, an artist and retired educator, will showcase his eclectic, extensive collection of beautiful butterflies, moths, and giant creepy-crawlies, a collection that he has displayed at hundreds of elementary schools throughout our region while presenting an entertaining and educational assembly program. This exhibit will



display specimens from every continent on Earth ranging from the tropical equatorial forests to the artic tundra, and our own special temperate environment will also be featured. Witness world-wide cryptic, gigantic silk moths, the dazzling iridescent morphos from tropical America, the beautiful, majestic bird-wing butterflies from Papua New Guinea, and much, much more.

A reception will be held Tuesday, March 22 in the Art Gallery from 4-5:30 pm. Mr. MacRoy will speak on his exhibit and his work for about an hour and will be available to answer questions after.
